 - Known about the overnight bus to places like Osaka and Sendai sooner. The shinkansen can get really expensive and the overnight bus is a great way to save money and travel long distances. I also wish I had eaten more types of Japanese food.

My research project was mostly focused on the fabrication of microwells to trap single cells efficiently. The straighter the side wall of the wells, the better it did at trapping the cells when a flow was introduced. My project helped me gain wet lab experience, which I know will be useful for when I plan to conduct my own research in the future. I had an overall great experience at my lab; however, I wish I did get a more social lab than the one I had. I heard about the experiences people in the Kyoto and Osaka area had and I was a little jealous of how lively their labs were. Although my mentor's English wasn't that proficient, I did have a fun time learning Japanese lab terms and teaching him lab terms in English. As well as random English words from time to time.

The overall environment of my lab was quite introverted. People were nice and welcomed me, but I didn't do much outside of the lab setting with the people in my lab. The most I did was go out to lunch a couple of times with the other international PhD students. I did run into some challenges with the language barrier while interacting with my mentor, but luckily, he was very enthusiastic about learning and overcoming the language barrier, so it wasn't much of an issue as the summer progressed.

A typical day consisted of me going to lab around 10 am (there was no strict time I had to be there) and taking the Den-en-toshi line to Shibuya, then transferring to the Inokashira line straight to the Komaba campus. Sometimes I would stop by 7-eleven to get a coffee or something for breakfast or I would go to a local bakery to buy their croissants or other pastries. After I was done with lab, I would take the same trains to go back to my apartment and maybe stop by FamilyMart for a treat. I did most of my travelling on the weekends except for the last week when I went to South Korea for 5 days. I did face some challenges while living in Tokyo, like getting lost in Shibuya station the first time I had to navigate it myself. Since my Japanese skills aren't the best, I had a hard time asking for help with directions. Also, I faced the harsh reality of being a black person in Japan a couple of times. I would always get stared at on the train or just walking on the street. Especially by little kids. People can also be quite pushy and impatient on the Tokyo trains and when getting off, Japanese people have (in my opinion) no sense of direction when walking anywhere. It can be really frustrating to think you can walk on one side just to have people bump into you anyway. I had to learn to be comfortable with no personal space on the trains too. Particularly if I was going back to my apartment at 5:00pm or going to lab at 9:30am. I am really proud of how much my Japanese skills have improved, especially with reading and understanding Japanese.
